From the Rector's Desk



On the last Sunday in June, an important, challenging, and gracefilled step was taken in our common life as 50 or so parishioners, spread out over three services, gathered for inperson worship under a tent in our parish hall parking lot.

We celebrated the Feast of the Nativity of St. John the Baptist after carefully considering how we might gather safely. At this service and in our Plan, I thanked everyone for being flexible and thoughtful as we wear in a new path through the wilderness. I wondered with your fellow parishioners what grace might be in store for us in this process. One observation about our past as we look towards our future is about our building. Whereas most congregations start small and grow until they can afford a building of their own, St. John in the Wilderness had a building prior to having a congregation! Yet we know that four walls and a roof don't make a Christian. Now we get to see what grace God has for us as we move beyond our sanctuary for a season -- a move that surely St. John the Baptist would approve of.

Of all the many summers in Flat Rock over the decades, I imagine that 2020 will prove to be one to remember (or perhaps one to forget)! I'm hoping that it is one of discipleship. What is left of our faith when we remove the trappings of Anglicanism that we so love? *Discipleship* -- that's what remains. We are left with the simplicity of following Jesus as we join with fellow disciples to wear in a new path through the Coronavirus wilderness.
