

From the Desk of Father Bill

Lenten Discipline



The season of Lent is a time of preparation for Easter, Advent is a

season of preparation for Christmas. Both Lent and Advent are "penitential"; that is, they are designed to be opportunities for introspection and reflection ... to acknowledge and come to terms with our own mortality and sinfulness and our need for forgiveness and reconciliation. During Lent, it used to be customary to make a personal sacrifice, to give up something craved, like chocolate or desserts or a bad habit like smoking or overindulgence. But then so often, after Lent was over, those cravings and bad habits resumed. A far more beneficial Lenten practice is to take on a new discipline or activity that will be lasting, rather than superficially giving up something.

During the four Sundays in Lent, our Adult Sunday School attendees will be introduced to an ancient spiritual discipline known as Lectio Divina (Latin for "divine reading"). It is a traditional Benedictine practice of scriptural reading, meditation, and prayer intended to promote communion with God and to increase knowledge of God's Word. It does not treat scripture as texts to be studied, but as the living Word. Typically, Lectio Divina has four separate steps: read – meditate – pray - contemplate. First, a passage of scripture is read (we will be using the Gospel readings from Luke for those Sundays in Lent); then its meaning is reflected upon. This is followed by prayer and contemplation on what God or Jesus is calling us to be or to do. The focus is not a theological analysis of biblical passages but viewing them with Christ as the key to their meaning.

I pray you will consider joining us. No materials are needed; just come and bring an unchurched friend or neighbor. With Monday and Saturday personal devotions in Mark, the Tuesday Lenten Supper Series, Wednesday Healing Services, Thursday Morning Prayer, Friday Stations of the Cross, and Lectio Divina on Sunday mornings, you will be taking on a Lenten discipline that will transform your life ... and you don't have to give up a thing, except your old way of being!

Being part of this ministry is a great way to get to know other women in the Parish, and it is a very gratifying way to serve a family mourning the loss of a loved one.

Vestry Highlights for February Meeting

- Approved taking on a bank loan of \$160,000 to pay off debt on Parish Hall construction/ Parish House renovation project; approved applying \$81,000 unrestricted estate gift to reduce debt.
- Junior Warden reported on a new parsonage lease agreement to be reviewed by attorney; plan being developed for church and Parish House safety and security.
- Senior Warden reported on Building and Grounds Committee's proposed policy regarding church signage; referred to Bylaws, Canons and Insurance Committee for review.
- 2019 stewardship campaign resulted in a 5 percent increase over 2018 \$479,000 which is \$4,000 over the budgeted figure; plans underway for a Gifts and Talents survey.
- 2019 budget income and expenses are forecasted for each month for easier tracking.
- Bylaws, Canons and Insurance Committee had first readings of proposed amendments to the Historic Churchyard, Endowments, and Christian Education committees; first vote to approve was unanimous.
- Approved recommendation from Historic Churchyard Committee regarding fees for niches.
- Request from Discernment Committee for vestry support in implementing CAT survey and Holy Conversations.

Discernment Committee Update



On February 11, the Discernment Committee met again with Canon Augusta Anderson to refine concepts and timelines for both the Congregational Assessment Tool (parishioner survey) and Holy Conversations. These two events are the key ingredients in the process of identifying the will of the parish in selecting a new rector.

The survey is scheduled to be made available to parishioners beginning on March 3 and will be open for three weeks to allow adequate time for all members of the parish to participate. The principal method of completing the questionnaire will be online. Instructions will be forwarded via e-mail to those for whom we have addresses, and a link will be placed on the parish website. For those who need it, we will have time and space to use laptop computers set up in the Parish House, and paper versions can also be provided. All members of St. John in the Wilderness are strongly encouraged to participate in this survey. In order for this to be a truly inclusive process, we need your input.

The results of the survey will be tabulated by Holy Cow Consulting, and the Discernment Committee will use the information as the basis for creating a profile of the credentials, skills, and experiences we will be seeking in our next rector.

The Holy Conversations supplement the Congregational Assessment Tool by allowing parishioners to provide, in person, their views on the character of our church and optimal ways of going forward. The dates for these focus group-type meetings are being finalized, but we will most likely have four of them beginning in May and extending into early June. Parishioners will need to sign up for these sessions, and in the weeks leading up to the meetings we will have sign-up sheets at the church entrances during services, at the monthly breakfast, and also in the church office.

2019 finds ECW preparing for another enjoyable and productive year at St. John. We kicked off the year with a visit to the Oriole Mill in Hendersonville. The Mill has been operating since 2006, producing beautiful Jacquard and Dobby woven textiles. The tour was fascinating and extremely informative. The response was so positive we may repeat the tour later in the year. In February, the ECW team leaders met to discuss the 2019 calendar and to plan upcoming events.

On Sunday, April 28, we will join with the church to support the Annual Empty Bowls event. ECW members provide desserts for the soup dinner, including pies, cakes, and cookies. There will be three seatings this year, one at 12:30 p.m., one at 3, and the last at 6. It is a wonderful event, and your participation is greatly appreciated.

On Wednesday, May 1, we will welcome the Kenmure Show Chorus, which will entertain us with songs from a variety of artists. We will follow the production with a pot luck luncheon. More information will be forthcoming.

As is our practice, in years when we do not conduct a May Market, we hold a Cakeless Bake Sale to raise money for our charitable outreach. This year's event will occur in June, so watch your mail for the announcement.

The premier fellowship event of the year, the Annual ECW Retreat, is under discussion. We are considering an off-site, overnight event, possibly at the Kanuga Conference Center. Discussions are preliminary now, but I'd ask you to consider the prospect of an overnight retreat and your ability to attend. Please let me know what you think of the idea.

As you know, through our ECW Make a Difference (MAD) project, the ECW provides monetary grants to family and community support agencies in the Hendersonville area. Here are a couple of the thank you notes received in 2018:

Apple Country Woodcrafters: "We very much appreciate the Make a Difference grant presented to us at the ACW's Annual Toy Party. As the club has grown (over 200 members now) and we have increased the number of toys we build, the cost of materials has risen, too. Our donated lumber is only the beginning of the process. I can remember back in 2010, we made fewer than 1,000 toys. For the past three years, our number has exceeded 2,000. The support we have enjoyed from ECW has certainly helped us to achieve this level. ACW and the community make wonderful partnerships.
